Askew writes, 'These books were probably published between 1812 and 1816, and were usually bound up together.' Humphries and Smith mention the book, as Kinloch's only publication, c. 1815.

On p 1, vol 1 is a footnote, 'N.B. Mr Kinloch thinks it necessary to state for the information of the Publishers of Music, that the Bases and arrangements of the aairs in this Vol: for the pianoforte (with the exception of Nos. 2, 13, 14, 20, 21.) are entirely new, and done purposely for him by Mr. Thomson.-' and on p 1, vol 2, 'The whole of the tunes in this Vol: are arranged by Mr. Thomson.'

A ticket for 'Mr. Kinloch's Ball' engraved by Thomas Bewick (1753-1828) is reproduced in J. Boyd, *Bewick Gleanings* (Newcastle, 1886; reprinted 1973), Plate XXVI. The editor notes that Mr. Kinloch was a noted dancing master, from whom her aunts and uncles took lessons 'in former days'. The ticket shows a group of dancers and a seated piper playing on the Northumbrian small pipes.

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
